

An encompassing understanding of when citizens will support policy concessions and pacts is valuable in a context of high party fragmentation and polarization.

The Future of Progressive Politics



As a member of the theme group, Stefanie Reher investigates public attitudes towards disabled election candidates, focusing on how candidates communicate their disabilities and how voters' own experiences and relationships with disability and ableism influence their attitudes. About 20 percent of our society is made up of people with disabilities. However, disabled people are underrepresented in politics, which may impact the representation of their interests in public policy and perpetuate their marginalization.

As part of the Co-Amsterdam platform and methodology, Christian Iaione aims to investigate how self-organization and collective action can serve as design principles for a local digital and institutional architecture that facilitates smooth interaction among multicultural communities in vulnerable neighborhoods of Amsterdam. He seeks to enable the creation and self-organization of diverse urban pools through partnerships designed to share the use, management, and ownership of essential urban infrastructure, such as digital, transport, energy networks, and housing.

Modeling the dynamics of communicative resources used in interaction



Exploring late language development through crosssyndrome comparisons: The search for universal markers of language impairment

A majority of deaf children are born into hearing families, resulting in delayed exposure to sign language and partial exposure to spoken language. This delay in language acquisition has been understudied, resulting in important gaps in our knowledge of language development in hearing-impaired individuals. Josep Ouer examines two phenomena as markers of delayed development in both hearing and hearing-impaired populations: the linguistic expression of counterfactual thoughts and the ascription of beliefs with the interaction of verbal mood.

In international human rights law, privacy and intimacy are considered fundamental rights. Privacy encompasses the home and private life, while intimacy includes emotional and sexual aspects of one's life. These rights are based on the assumption that the private and public spheres are separated by the walls of one's home. Luisa Schneider explores the impact of houselessness on privacy and intimacy, analyzing the institutional, legal, and social aspects of the lives of over three hundred houseless individuals in Germany.

In the Netherlands, carceral imaginaries tend to cluster into three seemingly unrelated strands: the prison as spectacle, the horrors of WWII camps, and precarious living in migrant detention centres. Such depictions tend to overlook formative colonial histories. Hanneke Stuit studies three specific Dutch detention sites - the Colonies of Benevolence, camp Westerbork, and the asylum centre in Ter Apel and seeks to shed light on the often unacknowledged influence of Dutch colonialism on imprisonment, both at home and abroad.

The New Southbound Policy (NSP), introduced in 2016, is the flagship initiative of Taiwan's ruling Democratic Progressive Party. Its primary objective is to enhance bilateral relationships with countries in South and Southeast Asia, reducing Taiwan's economic dependence on the Chinese market. Ting-Fai Yu seeks to address the lack of sustained scholarly investigation into the role of cultural production and creative practices in facilitating Taiwan's ambitious outbound project for global relevance, particularly in the context of Southeast Asia.
